

Hemophilia Foundation of Michigan Legislator Talking Points

Introduce Yourself!

Ask if the person you are meeting with knows about hemophilia and other bleeding disorders. If not, share basics on bleeding disorders:

- Hemophilia, von Willebrand Disease, and other related bleeding disorders are rare, genetic conditions for which there are no known cures.
- Individuals often experience spontaneous and prolonged internal bleeding in joints and tissues.
- To effectively manage these disorders, patients require life-long infusions of a costly life-saving treatment called clotting factor.

Why you are there:

• In the current political climate, changes to health care have been front and center and the bleeding disorders community is concerned for the future of health care.

Explain how access to quality health care is vital for individuals with bleeding disorders:

- Recent policies implemented with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act have greatly benefited the bleeding disorders community.
 - Coverage for preexisiting conditions
 - o Coverage for children up to age 26
 - o No annual or lifetime maximums on benefits
 - Limits on out-of-pocket expenses
- On the state level, Children's Special Healthcare Services maintains access to care for many individuals impacted by a bleeding disorder by helping to cover the costs of treatment related to their disorder.
- Without CSHCS, the costs associated with treatment for bleeding disorders would be prohibitive to care.
- Explain how CSHCS has impacted your life, or the life of someone you know.
